	redistricting process throughout the county, saving agencies across the county thousands of dollars.
	Budgeting Inside the Box: Why things won't get any better ~ Ken Terrinoni, Boone County Administrator
	With public sector budgeting in Illinois, it's about thinking inside the box. Revenues are actually, in some cases,
	shrinking; while expenditures especially mandates cannot be avoided, and grow. This session will focus on
	strategies to deal with the fiscal reality of our times and ways to reach consensus with your County Board on realistic
	policy options. Topics include basic budgeting techniques, the budget process as a tool, basic accounting concepts,
	and financing alternatives, including debt management and various approaches to bonds. We in county government
